Wondering Center News

Frances Mercer

News from the Wondering Center for December 2018 submitted by Frances Mercer The monthly "RE-Frigerator Page" from the Family Quest of the Church of the Larger Fellowship (CLF) (www.clfuu.org) has been a positive addition to the Wondering Center's resources for children and families. We have enjoyed and been stimulated by the Pages for September, October, and November, with their monthly themes of change, persistence and ancestors. The theme for December is humility. Throughout December copies of the December RE-Frigerator Page will be available on the Wondering Center table in the foyer and given to the children to take home. The five sections of the Page provide information, perspectives and questions to share and discussion with children:

- 1) We Celebrate the theme of humility "...being humble—having humility—is understanding that you are not better or more important than others. However, it doesn't mean feeling shame or thinking that others are more important than you....";
- 2) We Honor—Dr. Albert Schweitzer as an example of an extraordinary humble person;
- 3) Act—Acting or living with humility "teaches us to put aside our assumptions and actually listen to people before we try to change things in their lives....";
- 4) Nurturing the Spirit—"One way to practice humility is to literally lower yourself, to get closer to the ground—sit or lie down to take on a new perspective..."; and
- 5) *Practicing the Principles*—Our seventh UU principle describes what it means to live with humility—respect for the interdependent web of all existence, of which we are a part."

The CLF materials also provide lessons for each of the five Sundays in December. These lessons focus on Winter spiritual holidays—"In the Northern Hemisphere, this is the darkest part of the year, and there are a number of spiritual holidays which focus on light. Light can be a symbol of many things and these holidays provide a chance to pay attention to the different things that light might represent." These lessons highlight the spiritual holidays of: 1) Jewish Hanukkah, 2) Enlightenment of the Buddha, 3) Santa Lucia Day & Solstice, 4) Christmas, and 5) Kwanzaa. For the December Sundays at All Souls, we will be using some of these materials, but we will have to be selective because of our limited time each Sunday.

 December 2: We will explore what it means to be humble and to live with humility — the monthly theme presented in the December RE-Frigerator Page.

- December 9: We will explore the kinds of giving and receiving that are of such intense
 interest in this holiday season, but also giving and receiving as important parts of living a
 good life.
- December 16: We will explore rituals from many different faiths that involve light (lighting of candles, yule logs, tree lights, oil lamps, etc.) during this darkest part of the year.
- December 24 Christmas Eve: As in past years, children of all ages and their families and friends will participate in the multigenerational service and reception.
- December 30: We will explore the many ways people all over the world say good bye to the old year and welcome the New Year.

Capital Campaign Update

We are now entering the third, and final, year of the three year Campaign for All Souls approved by the board in 2016. At this point, we have been promised \$34,650, which is more than one half of our \$50,000 goal. And, we have actually received almost \$31,000 of the amount promised! Thanks to everyone who made a commitment to contribute to this worthy cause, and a very special thanks to all of those who have already paid the amount they promised!

We began this campaign in 2016 with the goal of raising a minimum of \$50,000, with monies earmarked to repair and improve our buildings and grounds. A dedicated Building and Grounds committee has nearly completed work on the new handicap accessible bathroom, which is located in the RE wing on the right just beyond the janitor's room. We have also installed automatic door openers so that people with handicaps, and those carrying large pot-luck dishes, can enter the building and the RE wing without difficulty. Thanks go out to Rebecca Carr, Till Fritzsching, and Robert South for all their hard work on these, and other projects. We saved a great deal of money by doing much of the work in house with volunteer labor.

Your generosity has also enabled us to replace four of the five furnaces that keep our building warm in the winter (yes, we have a total of five furnaces for this spread-out building!). And we have resurfaced the parking lot.

At this point we find that the climate has not been kind to our building and the roof over the sanctuary, which faces directly into the worst of the winter weather, is in need of replacing. Work is also needed on the clerestory windows above that roof. We are currently in the process of taking bids and hope to replace this shingle roof with a metal one within the next year. It's our hope that we'll also have enough funds to be able to improve the sound system in our sanctuary.

For those who are making a three-year sustaining gift, and for those who are giving year by year, we gratefully thank you! We have the information you provided last year and the year before. For those who are receiving this request for the first time, we invite you to generously join our efforts: Expansive possibilities can only happen when we collectively offer our financial support. Being a community of relatively few, we need

the gifts of each if we are to succeed, and your important donation will ensure that success. When we envision our past in light of our present, we invoke a new future.

This year we are holding a number of fundraisers designed both to bring us together as a congregation while also providing funding for our campaign. Many of us have been enjoying the fundraising dinners at Panera and we will continue to have them with proceeds going towards the

Capital Campaign. And we are asking you to dream up interesting activities and items to donate to an ongoing silent auction. Some suggestions of possible activities to offer for bidding are a Bridge and Dessert evening; a playdate for the children; learn to make potato jewelry; a cooking class; lunch and conversation for four at one of Watertown's new lunch spots; a guided tour of the International Maple Museum in Croghan (hosted by Warren and Eleanor Allen).



For 2018-2019 Common Read

This year the common read is "The Once and Future Liberal" by Mark Lilla. Robert suggested this book, rather than one of those from the UUA list of suggestions, specifically because it was controversial. Last year's selection, "Democracy Now" was indeed a good book with some good information and excellent things to say. But there was nothing to talk about because we all agree with the

message, and a group of people simply nodding and saying, "Yep, I agree with that," isn't a conversation,

it's a litany. It was way over on the side of reasonable and we are all on the same side.



"The Once and Future Liberal" is more likely to fall right in the middle of us. It might divide us into supporters and detractors. As Wikipedia says, "The author argues for American liberals to emphasize commonalities as citizens in their politics, rather than differences of identity." Now you may think a book about politics is inappropriate for a religious organization, but if you read the book you'll find that there's an important spiritual element. Lilla criticizes the inward, self centered, focus of interests groups, which are all part of in one way or another, and suggests we should instead look outward and focus on working for the good of all. This year we chose Hospice and Planned Parenthood. Each organization receives 1/4 of the uncommitted funds for the year.

Unitarian Universalist Association

From the UUSC:

While the midterm elections have passed, President Trump is still actively working to advance a xenophobic, white nationalist agenda. He has requested increased funding for immigration enforcement to target and detain asylum-seekers—children and families in flight from violence and extreme hardship.

Congress has the power to halt the expansion of Trump's racist agenda by denying him the funding for these efforts.

Urge your members of Congress to deny funding requests that would support an expanded border wall; immigration detention, prosecution, deportation, and militarization of the southern border. We cannot allow U.S. tax dollars to fund human rights abuses and hate in the name of immigration enforcement.

Congress is expected to vote on the annual funding bill shortly. We still have time to make our voices heard on this issue. Thank you for taking action right now.
